	Assin Manso Ancestral Slave River Park	<p>The site marks the final resting place of enslaved Africans who died during the transatlantic slave trade. The park is located along the banks of the River Ansasa, which was a major route for enslaved Africans being transported to the coast for export. It contains graves and memorials honoring the ancestors who were enslaved and lost their lives during the brutal slave trade.</p>
	Bono Manso Slave Market	<p>The Bono Manso Slave Market in the Bono East Region is another slave route that holds a significant historical importance in the context of the slave trade in Ghana. This market served as a crucial hub where slaves from northern Ghana, including areas like Salaga and Pikworo, were brought for sorting and grading. Here, the captives were divided based on their physical strength and age, with the strongest individuals selected for transportation to the coast and subsequent sale to the Americas. Those deemed weaker were left behind in the town. Remarkably, some of the trees used to tether the slaves as they awaited sale and shipment to Europe and the Americas are still standing, serving as somber reminders of this dark chapter in history.</p>

	Cape coast and Elmina Castle		UNESCO World Heritage Site, where the echoes of Ghana's poignant history resonate through its dramatic coastal fortifications, offering an immersive journey into the era of the trans-Atlantic slave trade and a profound reflection on resilience and heritage. The cape coast and Elmina castle served as the permanent and largest slave trading market as at that time, slaves used to be transported from the North and other part of the country to their final destination which is the Cape coast and Elmina castle to be sold out. Due to the large number of slaves they built smaller dungeons where they kept large number of healthy African youth who were to be sold or used to work. The castles trade used to be only involved in gold, wood and textile until the English Merchants took
